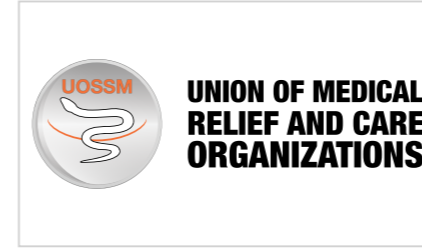

- 1. Participate** in meetings, conferences, and events relating to the humanitarian response in Syria, to advocate for issues of great concern to civilians affected by the Syrian crisis, and to play a pro-active role in coordinating efforts and ensuring a better humanitarian response.
- 2. Engage** in focused meetings with decision-makers and officials from UN State Members that are involved in the Syrian context, to improve the humanitarian response and the protection of civilians and humanitarian workers.
- 3. Be represented** at various events such as: The Humanitarian Liaison Group (HLG), the Strategic Steering Group (SSG), the Inter-Cluster Coordination Group (ICCG), Top Donor Group Meetings, Donor Conference (i.e. Brussels and London Conferences for Syria), Senior Officials Meetings, Post-SSG Donor meetings and the Humanitarian Summit in Istanbul.
- 4. Liaise** with other NGO fora (regionally and internationally) such as the Syrian Networks League (SNL), The Syria International NGO Regional Forum (SIRF), and NGO Forum northwest Syria, to better understand the collective challenges and put together the best ways to mitigate them and to coordinate advocacy efforts.
- 5. Serve** as a platform to effectively address challenges, discuss solutions and conduct capacity building, and to share lessons learned and best practices internally within the Alliance and externally with other stakeholders and partners.
- 6. Hold** media conferences, publish statements, videos, and news to raise awareness about and advocate for key humanitarian issues.

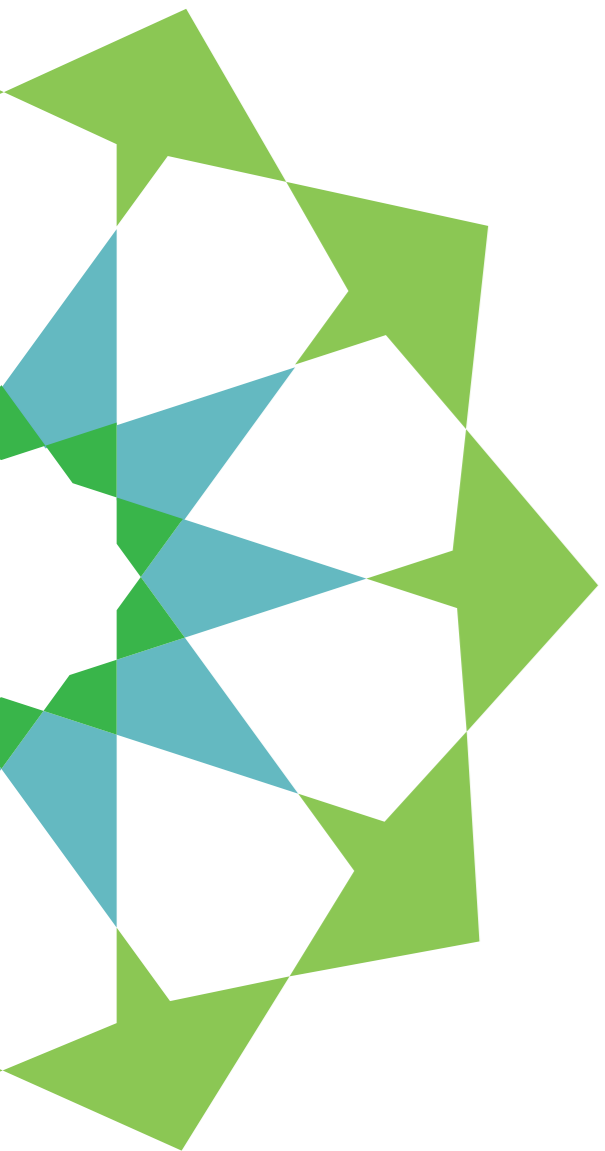

Major Achievements in 2019

Advocacy

Campaigns, Events, and Trainings

SNA has developed a **short-term advocacy plan as a proactive action to counterfort the suspension of the fund for life-saving activities at the NWS**. The major goals of the plan were improving access to humanitarian services and improving the protection of humanitarian workers and civilians in Syria. The plan was initiated by publishing an advocacy statement regarding “**The Challenges and Risks That Humanitarian Works is Facing and the Importance of its Continuity in Northwestern Syria**” this statement has been drafted by SNA and published on 21 Jan 2019, by the Syrian Networks League (SNL) after it has received 173 signatories, please find the statement in [Arabic](#) and in [English](#).

The SNA has organized a two-part **Advocacy Training** between 1618- May and 2224- June. The training was provided by the Advocacy Consultant and Trainer Mr.

Imad Bazzi and it was funded by ECHO through Big Heart Foundation. The first part was attended by the SNA organizations’ senior management and concentrated on the strategic planning for advocacy, the second part targeted the Media and Communication technical teams and it concentrated on media strategies and tactics, and internal communications. The consultant also provided a recommended methodology for a strategic plan for the SNA.

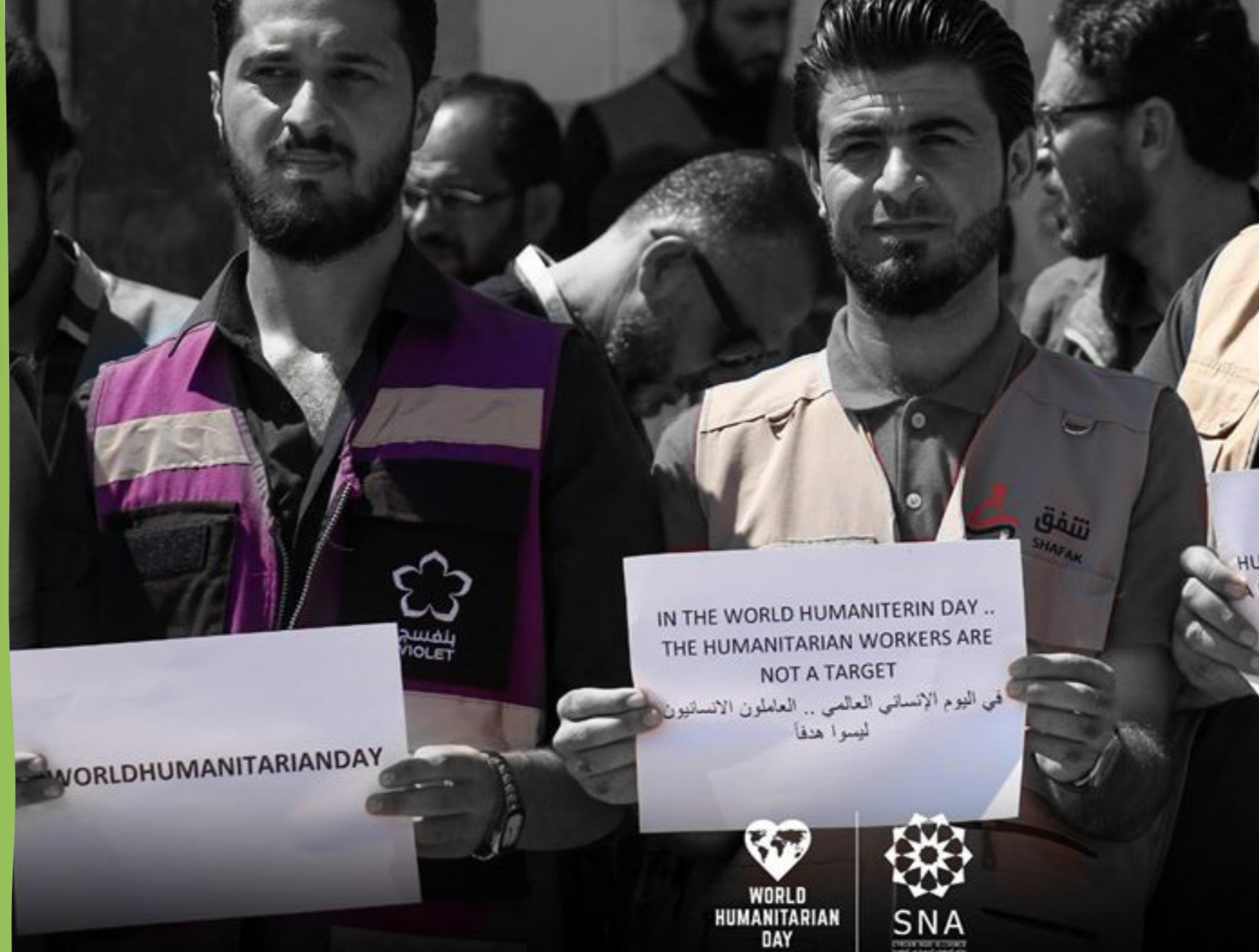
On 31 May, SNA co-organized a joint **Press Conference** in Istanbul, Elite World Hotel, with [the Syrian Civil Defence](#) (The White Helmets), regarding the **Imminent Humanitarian Disaster in NW Syria**. Watch the [conference](#) and the [Infographic Video](#) and read the joint Press Release [English](#) and [Arabic](#). A large number of international and local media agencies were present,

several of whom broadcasted interviews or published articles and interviews in response to the conference and the situation in Idlib. Below is a list of some of these articles (11 articles) in mostly in English, but also in Arabic, French, and German ([REUTERS](#), [Le Figaro](#), [The Washington Post](#), [The Independent](#), [Der Tagesspiegel](#), [Vice News](#), [DW](#), [The Arab Weekly](#), [Alquds](#), [The New Arab](#), and [Aljumhuriya](#))

The SNA led the advocacy efforts regarding changes in the **United Nations WoS Coordination Structure** to make sure that any change will be based on a comprehensive consultation and principled review that will make sure any change will be for enhancing of humanitarian action in Syria, the SNA was represented in several SSG, post-SSG and HLG and other meetings related to WoS coordination structure such as the small group which has been

established by the SSG to discuss the WoS Coordination Structure scenarios. Additionally, SNA has drafted and sent a joint letter to Mr. António Guterres, United Nations Secretary-General regarding this matter; this letter has been signed by more than 170 Syrian NGOs. SNA efforts have played a critical role in the extension of the contract until the end of 2019 for Mr. Panos Moutziz, the Regional Humanitarian Coordinator for the Syrian Crisis. Our efforts also contributed to the leadership of the Whole of Syria UN Mechanism to be divided between Damascus and the Cross-border hub based in Gaziantep who both would report directly to Mark Lowcock the United Nations Under-Secretary-General for Humanitarian Affairs and Emergency Relief Coordinator.

17 SNA members along with four INGOs working in Syria (Mercy Corps, Norwegian Refugee Council-NRC, CARE and World Vision) have issued a joint private letter to the UN Secretary-General, regarding the upcoming **Children and Armed Conflict report**, and specifically the concerning plans to downgrade of the Government of Syria to the 'improved' group. Given that the GoS has primarily been listed for killing & maiming and attacks on schools & hospitals, and that we've seen at least 140 children killed in the escalation in NW Syria and dozens of schools and medical facilities hit. The CAAC report has been released and the Government of Syria has been listed in the 'A' category, contrary to the SRSG's recommendation and in line with our message to the SG. Moreover, the SNA has published a [press release](#) on 7 August 2019 regarding the letter and its outcomes.



The SNA through its Communications and Media Working Group (CMWG) has launched a media campaign for World **Humanitarian Day 2019**, 19 August. Firstly, SNA organized a [gathering](#) on World Humanitarian Day (Monday 19th of August) to commemorate fallen humanitarian workers and in solidarity with their families and with humanitarian workers in Syria, whether injured, detained, kidnapped, or facing risks and to demand the international community and the United Nations to shoulder effectively and seriously their responsibilities in protecting the humanitarian workers, activities, and facilities in northwest Syria. The gathering was attended by over 300 humanitarian workers, females, and males, from 20 Syrian NGOs working in Northwest Syria. Participants carried a poster including 165 photographs of martyred Syrian humanitarian workers. Secondly, SNA Communication and Media Working Group (CMWG) has



produced over 10 videos presenting messages about the daily activities of humanitarian workers including their suffering, hopes and reflections and of humane bonds between humanitarian workers and beneficiaries. The videos were posted on SNA Facebook page and shared by SNA member organizations.

On 9 October 2019, the SNA held a workshop under the title: **Education in Northwest Syria: Problems and Solutions**. The workshop was decided as an action point in the previous SNA General Assembly meeting to discuss the needs and gaps in the education response in Northwest Syria and come up with recommendations and advocacy messages. [Meeting outcomes](#) were shared with participants (education managers of Shafak, Violet, and Children of One World) and the SNA members for future discussion and action on the topic.

In December 2019, the SNA through its Communications and Media Working Group (CMWG) launched a media campaign titled “**Winter is Coming**” to shed light on the suffering and difficult living conditions facing IDPs during winter in Northwest Syria. The campaign products included videos, a photo with a story and posters. The campaign was launched by publishing a video about the suffering of IPDs residing in camps during the winter. 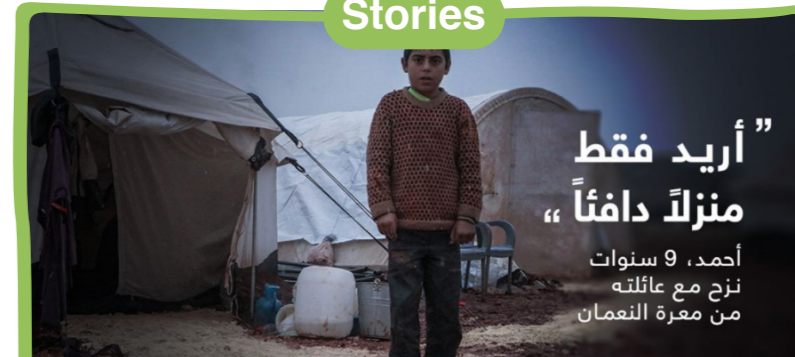

Advocacy Statements

Regarding the advocacy efforts for the humanitarian crisis in the northern Hama and southern Idlib, the SNA has:

- On 10 Jan 2019, SNA has published an advocacy statement regarding “Targeting of the Health Facilities and Humanitarian Workers Recently in The NW Syria” with 16 signatories from SNA members. Please find the statement in [Arabic](#) and in [English](#).
- Released a public [Statement Regarding The Military Escalation In North-West Syria](#). 9 May 2019.
- Participated in developing, drafting and signing a joint [letter to the UNSC Regarding the Situation in Idlib](#), with 243 local NGOs. 9 May 2019.
- Released a joint Press Statement with Crisis Action and other with 43 Syrian and international NGOs called for an immediate end to attacks on civilians and hospitals in Idlib, Syria. Links on [SNA Website](#) and [Reliefweb](#). 24 May 2019.
- Regarding advocacy efforts for the protection of the humanitarian facilities and humanitarian workers, SNA sent a **letter to the top UN officials related to the investigation mechanisms for immediate action responding to the systematic attacks on humanitarian facilities**. The letter has been drafted in July. SNA has also published a [press release](#) on the matter.
- SNA has continued its advocacy efforts related to the deteriorating **humanitarian crisis in the northern Hama and southern Idlib**, SNA published a [statement](#) regarding the recent hostilities on civilians in the NWS on the first week of August.
- On 19 December 2019, The SNA prepared a **letter pertaining to the renewal of the UNSCR 2165**, This paper was drafted by the SNA team. 22 SNA members signed the letter, which was published on social

media accounts of the SNA and shared with the SNA mailing lists including the UN, donors including ECHO, the Office of the Special Envoy for Syria, INGOs, Syrian NGOs, and media. The letter urged the UNSC members to:

- ▶ **Approve** the previously agreed 4 crossing points in the recent resolution in addition to the fifth one in Tal Abyad in North-East Syria
- ▶ **Renew** the resolution for a minimum of 12 months to ensure effective humanitarian response planning and to minimize uncertainty and disruption to operations
- ▶ **Call** for the protection of Humanitarian Facilities and Aid Workers who play a major role in supporting people in need



Coordination

The SNA team and steering committee regularly attend coordination meetings with UN OCHA and National and Regional Fora, such as Humanitarian Liaison Group (HLG) Turkey Hub, WoS Strategic Steering Group (SSG), North-West Syria (NWS) NGO Forum General Assembly, SIRF Advocacy and Policy Working Group, North-West Syria (NWS) NGO Form Advocacy Working Group, and League of Syrian Networks Coordinators Committee, to name a few. SNA representatives also attend high-level meetings with Mr. Panos Moumtzis, the (RHC) and Mark Cutts the (DRHC), HLG, the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights, and the International Commission of Inquiry on the Syrian Arab Republic, and with other officials and institutions.

Mr. Zedoun Alzoubi, OUSSM CEO and SNA Steering Committee member, has represented SNA in the **Top-Donor Meeting in Istanbul** in February 2019.

Dr. Mazen Kewara, Syrian American Medical Society (SAMS) - Turkey CD and SNA Steering Committee chairman, has represented SNA in **the Senior Officials Meeting in Geneva**, Switzerland in February, 2019.

On 12-13 March, **SNA has high participation in the Brussels III conference**, 16 senior-level staff from 9 SNA members attended the conference and its side-events. In preparation for Brussel III Conference, SNA was part of developing three policy and position papers used at this conference: The Prospect of Returns, Now is NOT the Time, Protection of Civilians in Syria, and Letter Regarding Detainees to the EU. The SNA hosted a side-event in Brussels III: Aid Diversion in the Syria Crisis - Best Practices for Risk Mitigation and Lessons Learned.

On 26, 27, and 28 of March 2019, the SNA Coordinator Mr. Hosam Aldeen Fael, Mr. Abd Alwahab Jissri Sr Advocacy Officer in Big Heart, and SNA Steering Committee member, and Mr. Mazen Hussein, Organizational Development Manager at Syria Relief Organization and member of the SNA Steering Committee, attended the **International Council of Voluntary Agencies (ICVA) Annual Conference which was held in Geneva**, Switzerland.

On 12th April, SNA with support from and close coordination with the Syria Regional NGOs Forum (SIRF), NWS NGO

Forum, and the League of Syrian Networks (SNL) has organized **the 6th High-Level Meeting between INGOs/ SNGOs on a regional level in Istanbul**. The meeting was a full day, attended by 42 one, represented 15 INGOs and 19 local NOGs. The meeting discussed the following topics:

1. NGOs' Challenges in Each Hub (North West: Idlib/ Euphrates Shield area, Olive Branch, Central, and Southern Syria and Northeast Syria) and Funds and Donors' Commitment for Each Hub
2. Funds and Donors' Commitment to Refugees' Integration
3. Protection of Aid Workers (in areas taken by GoS and NW Syria)
4. "Whole of Syria" Coordination, Given the Conversations on a Potential Shift in the Architecture

The closing was a 2-hours open discussion session between the attendees and with honor guests, Mark Cutts

UN-DRHC Turkey Hub, Cedric Perso from ECHO Turkey and Nick Jones from DFID Turkey.

The SNA was represented by Mr. Abd Alwahab Jessry (Sr Advocacy Officer in Big Heart, and SNA Steering Committee member) on the **Syrian Diaspora Networks Group meeting in Paris, France on 24-26 April**. This meeting includes humanitarian, diaspora, and civil society-focused Syrian diaspora networks/coalitions/ alliances to support the joint goals of advocacy and coordination. The meeting brought together Syrian networks from the U.S., Turkey, Germany, France, the U.K., Sweden. The primary objectives of the meeting were to continue to explore collaboration, discuss urgent issues (such as refugee return), and coordinate messaging and advocacy.

The SNA was represented by Mr. Jean-Christophe Pegon the Senior Consultant with Big Heart Foundation at the **Third Brussels Conference Stock-Taking and Follow-Up Meeting** which was held on 16 June 2019 in Amman.



On 2nd September 2019, the SNA in cooperation with NGO Forum North West Syria and SIRF held the **7th High-level meeting between SNGOs and INGOs on a regional level in Istanbul** which was attended by senior management of over 40 SNGOs and INGOs working on the Syria Response. This meeting is one of a series of meetings, which started a year and a half ago. The idea was to bring NGOs from various hubs who are involved in Cross-border operations to discuss matters on a strategic level. The topics discussed at this meeting included:

- ▶ Protection of Humanitarian Facilities and Humanitarian Workers
- ▶ WoS Coordination Structure (Updates and Scenarios)
- ▶ Future of Syria Conference - Next Brussels - Preparations
- ▶ NWS Response and Challenges (and touching Cross-Border UNSC resolution)
- ▶ NES Response and Challenges
- ▶ Refugees Response and Neighboring Countries Programs

Fadi Al Dairi, Steering Committee Chairman and Country Director of Hand in Hand for Aid and Development represented the SNA at **the Syrian Diaspora Networks 4th meeting** held on 12-14 Sep in Brussels. Over three days representatives from eight networks and coalitions met in Brussels to continue improving coordination and collaboration. This meeting built on the previous meetings in April and January 2019 and November 2018 and led to agreement on the next steps forward, including guidelines for communication, the creation of a coordinated advocacy plan, and common topics of interest for advocacy.

Muhannad Othman, CEO of AHF and member of the SNA General Assembly attended **the 2020 Syria HPC Workshop 25 - 26 October 2019 Cairo** on behalf of the SNA. The workshop discussed the key results of the multi-sectoral needs assessment and analysis carried out in July and August. On the basis of this analysis, the workshop aimed to build consensus on the most critical needs to be highlighted in the 2020 HNO as well as how these will inform the response priorities of the 202 HRP in line with the ISG recommendations on the use of the revised HPC templates. Participants included members of the ISG, sector and inter-sector representatives of the Hubs and national and international NGOs.

The SNA issued a policy paper titled the “**Protection of Humanitarian Workers and Duty of Care in the Syrian Context**”. The draft was widely circulated with Syrian and international NGOs who are part of the Syria Response. The SNA received and consolidated dozens of comments and suggestions in order to reach the final version of the paper. The paper was published on the SNA social media and shared with the SNA mailing list including donors, UN, media and NGOs.

The SNA was represented at the **Advocacy Tour** in several European capitals which is organised by the the **Syrian Civil Society Organization Networks Platform (SCNP)** that focuses on the urgent needs of the people in northwest Syria and ensuring a more effective participation of Syrian voices in the upcoming Brussels conference on supporting Syria and the region in 2020. The tour took place in mid-November.

The SNA was represented at the **Senior Officials Meeting (SOM)** on the aid response in Syria on 19-20 November in Copenhagen, Denmark, by Mr. Husni Albarazi the founder of Big Heart Foundation and member of the SNA Steering Committee and Mr. Hisham Derani the CEO of Binaa for Relief and Development and member of the SNA Steering Committee.

Introduction & Achievements

Established in response to the Syrian conflict, Big Heart Foundation is a Syrian-led, non-profit NGO founded in 2013, which aims to alleviate human suffering through the impartial provision of humanitarian assistance. Big Heart designs and implements innovative and effective interventions for immediate relief, as well as, sustained programming to build resilience of affected populations and foundations for a better future. Since 2013, Big Heart has delivered vital assistance to vulnerable and underserved communities with a well-established, dynamic team of humanitarian, private sector and thematic and regional experts. Big Heart programming has included: distribution of essential and emergency food and Non-Food Items (NFI), shelter rehabilitation, Water, Sanitation & Hygiene (WASH) services including Solid Waste Management and delivery of potable clean water, Livelihoods, Education and Emergency cash programming.

Since June 2013, Big Heart has delivered more than \$130 million in aid of which in-kind donations account for \$81 million. With its unique DNA, Big Heart has developed the necessary contextual understanding, local acceptance, logistical and human resources to provide assistance-to-scale in response to increasingly complex situations. The extensive number of successfully implemented projects and grants - 69 to date – in partnerships with various INGOs, UN agencies and donors, demonstrates Big Heart's proven experience and capacity to: implement activities with sufficient flexibility to respond appropriately to the evolving context; achieve project outputs across multiple sectors and meet donor compliance. Big Heart is committed to transparent and quality interventions.

Big Heart is an active member of the FSL; SNFI; WASH and Education Clusters, with an active membership in the Cash Working Group. Big Heart also actively participates in the CCCM cluster, regularly contributing to its displacement tracking updates to support an enhanced and coordinated response in Syria. As a founding member of both the Humanitarian Liaison Group (HLG) and the Syrian NGO Alliance (SNA), Big Heart has played an active role in coordination of the cross-border Syrian response from Turkey. Big Heart continues to be an active member of the SNA leading on various Syria advocacy efforts. Big Heart was recently elected one of four Syrian NGOs on the Steering Committee of the NGO Forum and actively participates in the four sub-working groups.








In 2019, Big Heart reached nearly one million beneficiaries, implementing 20 projects inside Syria across five different sectors.





Big Heart 2019 Assistance has included the following

- ▶ Distribution of food kits
- ▶ Distribution of Ready-to-Eat (RTE) food rations
- ▶ Distribution of NFI kits
- ▶ Distribution of fuel, winter kits and cash-based winter assistance for winterization needs
- ▶ Provision of safe, affordable potable water through repair / rehabilitation of water stations and support for water station operations and maintenance
- ▶ Provision of Solid Waste Management (SWM) services
- ▶ Provision of hygiene assistance
- ▶ Rehabilitation to irrigation channels to farmer households
- ▶ Support to 14 formal schools in addition to non-formal summer programs for at-risk children
- ▶ Distribution of student bags, tents, recreational bags to students and teacher kits
- ▶ Cash for Work programming
- ▶ Distribution of Multi-Purpose Cash Grants (MPCGs)

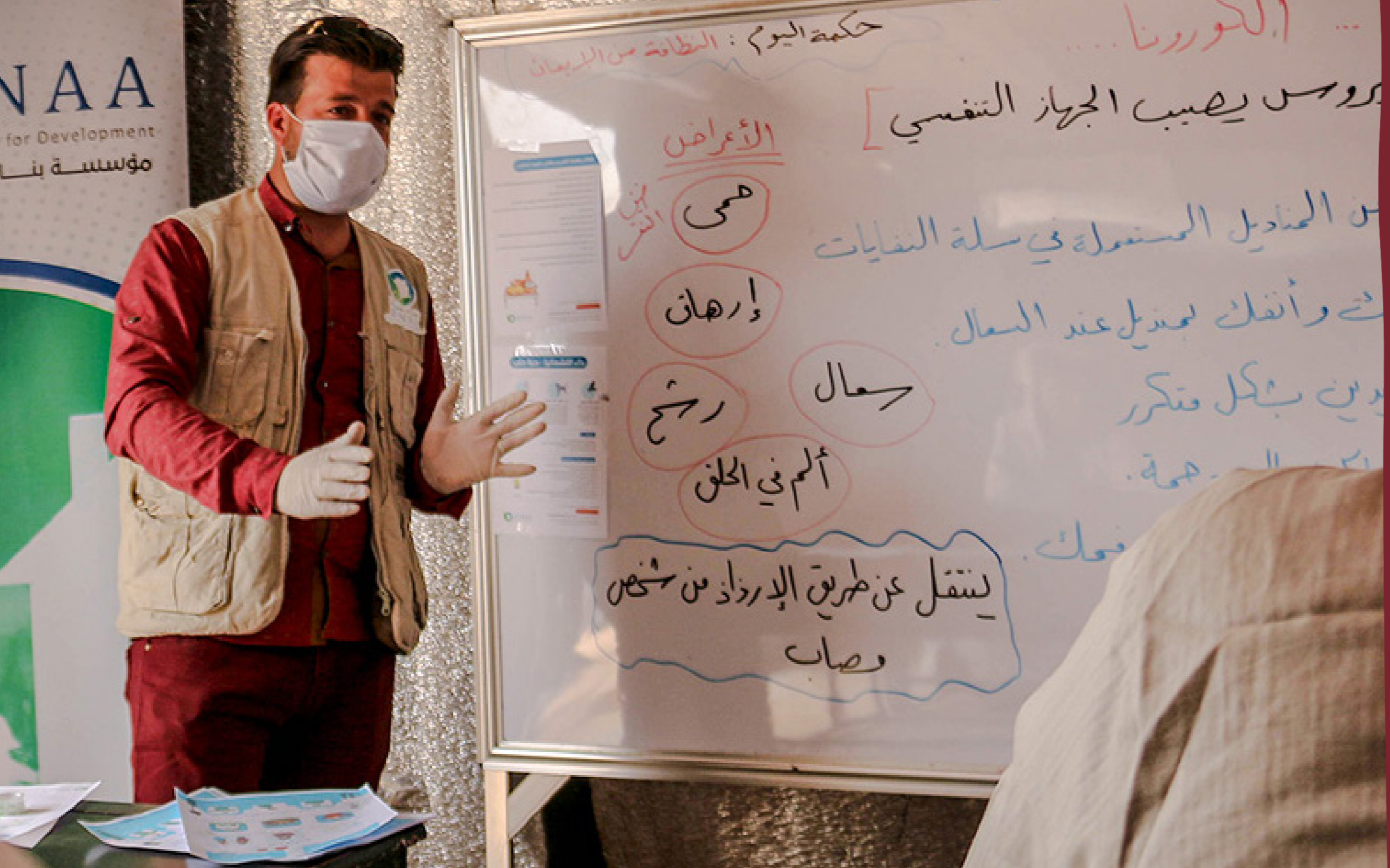







Introduction & Achievements






Binaa Organization for Development, a non-governmental non-profit humanitarian organization, was founded and licensed in January 2014 in Turkey. Cross-border humanitarian response was the starting point of this organization. Binaa came to existence as a natural evolution to an initiative that was started in 2013 by a group of Syrian engineers, entrepreneurs and expatriates who have worked in multiple diverse fields in many countries and have amassed more than 40 years of collective experience. 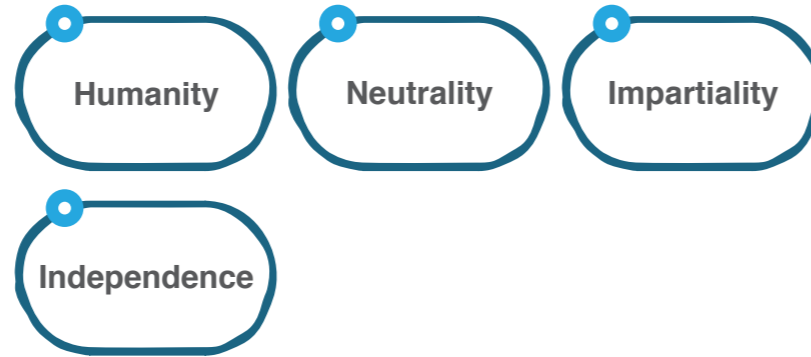

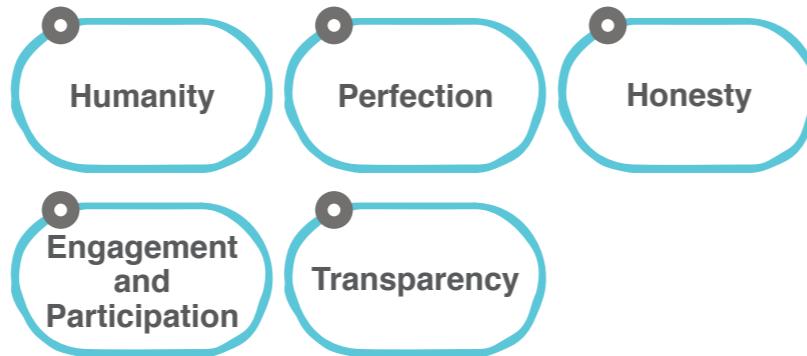

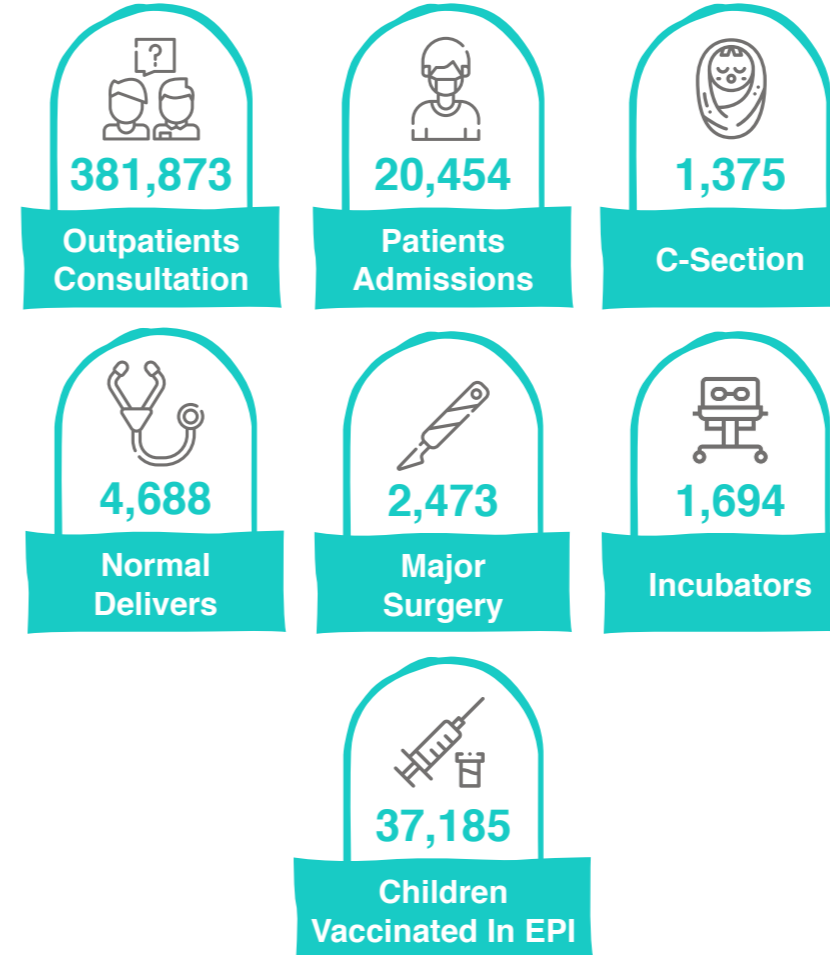
Aimed to support the most vulnerable Syrian refugees living in Turkey through, funding and managing shelters for widows with their children and rehabilitation center, multi-purpose cash assistance for vulnerable families & children without parental care, support “People with Disabilities” by providing Diapers and catheters.

Healthcare Programs

HIHFAD runs a network of healthcare facilities providing a wide range of services including reproductive health, trauma care, physiotherapy, medical education, prosthetics, management of non-communicable diseases, immunization Services, intensive care and dialysis services.

HIHFAD has established durable healthcare programmers and developed its capacity to manage hospitals and specialized units. Currently, HiHFAD fully support over ten primary, secondary, and tertiary healthcare facilities.

HIHFAD’s nutrition services have been integrated into our health network. Our primary health centers and our maternity and pediatric hospitals offer the nutrition program as part of the care provision.



Food Security

Ready-to-Eat meals (RTEs) and cooked meals are often provided to those displaced as a result of sudden displacement. Daily distribution of fresh bread packets and distributions of Food Baskets on a regular basis to IDPs and Vulnerable host communities.

Livelihood projects

Focus on farmers and provide them with vouchers to source seeds, fertilizers, and pesticides as well as irrigation vouchers to help farmers obtain high yields at the lowest costs.

Support the local economy by empowering farmers and inject the local market with fresh Vegetables & Wheat. Support farmers to mass produce Wheat and provide farmers with GAP (Good Agricultural Practices) training.

WASH

HIHFAD supports provision of treated water whether through the grid or by water trucking. Rehabilitation of water & sewage networks and hygiene promotion.

Protection

“I Can events” that promotes the importance of inclusion and organizes sporting events for persons with functional difficulties in northwest Syria.

The Program is quite extensive and includes: Inclusion Training & Awareness sessions, Risk Education, Peer Counseling, GBV awareness and support to victims of GBV.

Our centres provide individual and group counseling, focused PSS Psychological First Aid (PFA), focused PSS for GBV survivors, case management & Referrals and specialized mental health for GBV survivors.

The integration of PSEA across all programs as HIHFAD was the first Aid Agency to sign up to the PSEA community-based complaint mechanism.



Shelter and Non-Food Items (NFIs)

HIHFAD provides basic shelter support to both host communities and camps, with a wide variety of NFI distributed to IDPs ranging from hygiene kits, dignity kits, agriculture tool kits, shelter rehabilitation kits, water filtration kits, winterization kits, school kits, and fuel for heating.

Education

Support educational institutions by equipping schools with furniture such as desks, educational materials, and required resources to improve access to education which include school bags, stationary and psychological kits. In 2019, HIHFAD began rehabilitating schools in Syria and ensuring access to children with special physical needs.








Media, Advocacy & Documentation


HIHFAD media team documents all activities and provide an avenue for civilians badly affected by the war to share their stories and advocate for a better Syria. Our communication materials are guided by international humanitarian standards, as well as by internal and external policies.

Press releases, statements and articles are produced in various languages such as English, Arabic and Turkish; feeding into HIHFAD media channels and providing content for international media agencies.

A member of SNA (Syrian NGO Alliance), NW NGO Forum & SIRF (Syrian INGO Regional Forum) where Advocacy messages are joined and Global Advocacy to raise awareness and influence decision making.

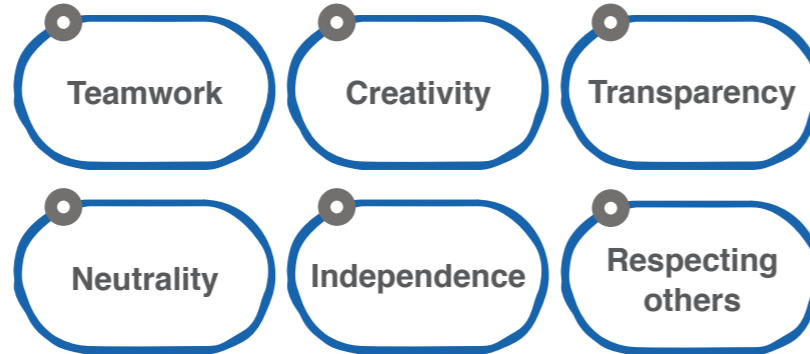

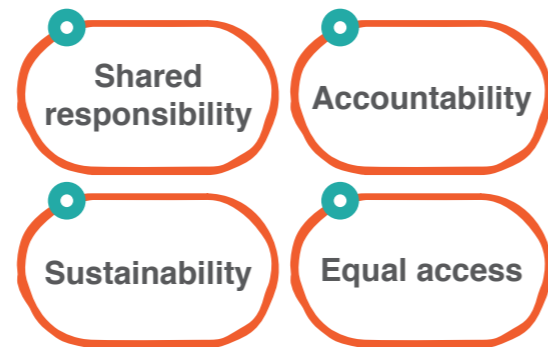

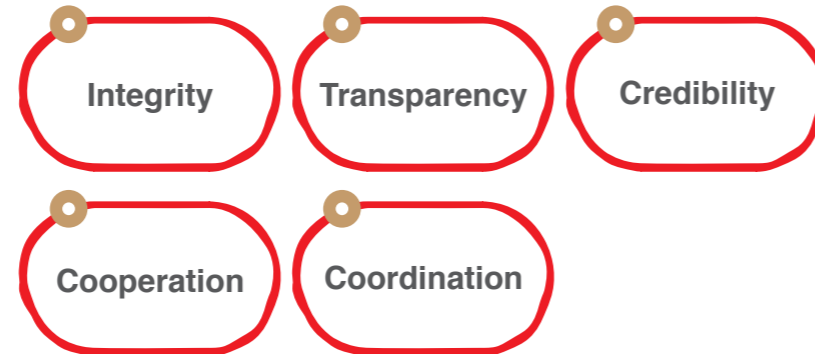

The Syrian American Medical Society (SAMS), a nonpolitical, nonprofit global medical relief organization that is working on the front lines of crisis relief in Syria, neighboring countries, and beyond to alleviate suffering and save lives. SAMS leads in providing a range of specialized services to vulnerable populations who struggle to access vital care.

Syria Cross border

In 2019, SAMS supported 50 health facilities in North west Syria, including 14 of the area's largest hospitals, SAMS doctors performed 31522 major surgeries and 99515 minor surgeries, and made over 1.7 million health consultations in 22 PHCs, SAMS supported 10 vaccination centers as part of the Expanded Program on Immunization (EPI). SAMS Also Integrated Gender Based Violence (GBV) services in five facilities in collaboration with local partners. And delivering specialized care through its Oncology center to provide treatment for Breast cancer, Lymphoma and other types.

SAMS also supported 2,100 medical personnel in 2019 and over 361 volunteers traveling from different countries around the world to join our missions.

SAMS conducted 233 health education workshops and trained 1,331 medical workers in Syria, including 17 training sessions in Gaziantep for 207 trainees.

And finally, SAMS delivered 238 containers to its healthcare facilities inside Syria, totaling over \$12 million in medical and humanitarian aid





Turkey

SAMS continues to expand its health programs and services targeting Syrian refugees in Turkey, in 2019, SAMS' MHPSS Center in Gaziantep provided services to 479 beneficiaries, many of whom were children. And another center for the management of Autism cases in Istanbul.

Jordan






In 2019, SAMS provided 29,069 services at our medical center in Al-Zaatari Refugee Camp, SAMS Medical Center in Al-Zaatari Camp operates a number of clinics, including primary emergency healthcare, dental, radiology and lab tests, as well as a well-equipped pharmacy. Additionally, the center provides oral rehydration salts (ORS) services, vaccinations, and family planning

Also, SAMS provided 11,262 mental health and psychosocial support services to Syrian refugees and underserved locals in Amman and Irbid.







Lebanon

In 2019, SAMS provided 16,879 medical services to Syrian refugees and underserved local populations in Lebanon. Also, 1,396 families benefited from the SAMS Community center in the Bekaa Valley including 3,057 children, 1,441 women.







SAMS organized seven specialized, life-altering medical missions to Lebanon in 2019 – including women's health, dental, orthopedic, and cardiology - providing care to 4,500 Syrian refugees who otherwise would have no access to these lifesaving services. These missions brought together 124 volunteers from all over the world.

The Syrian Expatriate Medical Association (SEMA) is a non-political, non-profit, medical relief organization, which aims to relieve human suffering by providing medical aid to those affected by conflict. SEMA believes that aid should be given to everyone in need regardless of his or her political, social, ethnic or religious identities.

SEMA believes in a world where vulnerable people no longer exist, and to provide access to relief services while pursuing the highest standards of quality under the slogan: “We Hold Good for All”.

SEMA was established in the mid of 2011, and then gained official recognition, licensing and registration in many European union countries such as France, Italy as well as Turkey.

SEMA has partnerships with UN agencies including OCHA, UNFPA, WHO, UNICEF, UNHCR and IOM, in addition to international organizations like IRC, CARE, El-Raha, World Vision International, and MAGNA.

SEMA is keen on being an active member in the health, protection and nutrition clusters to ensure the best coordination is perfectly done, to respond to the urgent needs of vulnerable people and to avoid duplication.

SEMA is co-lead of the Reproductive Health (RH) sub-cluster and is present in all related sub-clusters and coordination meetings.

SEMA supported about 12 facilities in the eastern Ghouta and the northern rural of Homs, as one of SEMA’s major achievement in Southern Syria was the access to besieged Eastern Ghouta, which assisted the local communities to benefit from free health services in an area torn apart by war and siege.

In the besieged area of Northern Homs, SEMA was considered the most active medical organization. Besides providing basic services, SEMA was supporting 3 trauma hospitals as well as 3 large RH hospitals, along with one mobile clinic. These hospitals introduced integrated activities for GBV survivors, case management, GBV kit provision, PSS activities, in addition to specific medical treatment as i.e. clinical management of rape (CMR).

SEMA got permission from the Turkish authorities to work in both Euphrates Shield and Olive branch areas, and now is operating 7 projects in the area.





SEMA's most remarkable experience is the multi sectoral integration programme modality, as SEMA for more than five years, includes a comprehensive reproductive health component, including gynecological, obstetric, prenatal and antenatal care as well as family planning and pediatric care into our health activities. We furthermore provide clinical care for GBV survivors, including clinical management of rape (CMR). In fact, SEMA is a strategic partner of the UNFPA in responding to reproductive health needs with a health and protection integrated approach. Furthermore, the majority of SEMA's facilities do provide nutrition services, including CMAM treatment, MUAC screening as well as IYCF consultations. SEMA furthermore relies on a network of Community Health Workers (CHW) to provide outreach activities and spread awareness on health, protection and nutrition services.

SEMA's response to emergencies is outstanding as SEMA responds in a well-organized action, which is planned, designed, and implemented promptly.

SEMA during the period extended between 2014 until now, performed and run many hospitals (RH and secondary health care services), PHCs (covering all 4 levels with vaccination) and mobile clinics in addition to specialized health services (Blood banks, dialysis centers, and prosthetic limbs), in addition to provision of protection services including: MHPSS, GBV, and CP services.

SEMA also has a distinct impact in medical education and training, by supporting medical academies and institutes in Syria and Turkey, in addition to providing online and in person training sessions on most up-to-date medical topics to help the staff strengthen their capacity.

SEMA provided its services for more than 7.5 million vulnerable people in Syria. It is a bit difficult to accurately determine the yearly average number of services, due to the significant changes in the conflict dynamics and their reflections on access and service delivery, yet it is worth mentioning that SEMA provided services for more than 750 K beneficiaries during 2019.

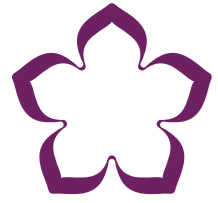

Introduction & Achievements





A number of aspiring young volunteers started to work spontaneously and voluntarily at the beginning of the Syrian conflict and the deterioration of the humanitarian situation at the end of 2011. They wanted to meet IDPS basic needs and alleviate the disastrous situation in Syria focusing on providing aid and food, in addition to collecting in-kind and cash materials to be distributed to the affected by conflict that secure their basic needs. The first office was established in the city of Idlib, and then was moved to the neighboring countryside. The work expanded to include the entire province of Idlib and other provinces. Violet Organization has worked so far in six provinces (Idlib, Aleppo, Hama, Damascus, Latakia, and Homs) in the areas ruled by opposing forces. Violet responds to emergencies in Syria in most humanitarian sectors: Food Security and Livelihood, Non-food Items and CBR, Education, Health and shelter. Violet integrates the protection sector in all the aforementioned sectors. With the length of the conflict and the survival of people



for long periods at stake, Violet's response has had to not only be focused on emergency response, but on the immediate implementation of long-impact health and education sector projects in all of Idlib. Violet worked to establish and develop its organizational structure to start officially as an organization registered in Turkey in 2014. Accordingly, Violet divided the work into key sectors that mimic the divisions of international humanitarian organizations and implemented the appropriate structure for all departments and staff.
