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About SNA

Introduction and Objectives

Syrian non-governmental organizations were established in response to the urgent humanitarian needs inside Syria and to support refugees in neighbouring countries after March 2011. Some of these organizations recognized the need to form an alliance to agree on joint advocacy messages regarding humanitarian issues. The Syrian NGO Alliance (SNA) was officially launched on April 2, 2014, in Gaziantep, Turkey.

As of 8 December 2024, with the announcement of Syria's liberation, SNA entered a new phase of work from within the country by relocating its main office to Damascus and expanding its presence across various Syrian regions. This transition marked a pivotal moment in the SNA's journey, refocusing its priorities on supporting local communities through strengthened advocacy efforts, expanded networking with local and international actors, and investment in capacity-building, thereby enhancing local leadership and fostering sustainable humanitarian action.

About Us

SNA consists of 22 Syrian NGOs, among the largest working to meet humanitarian needs in line with international standards and protocols. SNA provides a platform for these NGOs to coordinate and advocate for shared messages, ensuring the voices of affected populations are heard. SNA plays an active role in shaping how aid is delivered in Syria. SNA was established on April 2, 2014, in Gaziantep, Turkey.

Our Activities



- ✓ Throughout 2024, SNA played a leading role in shaping and guiding humanitarian discussions about Syria, significantly representing the voice of Syrian organizations both locally and internationally. The Alliance was not merely a participant in events; it acted as an initiator, guide, and influencer in advocacy and coordination policies.
- ✓ The year began with strengthening dialogue channels with the international community, where SNA served as a key partner in several strategic meetings. At the European Humanitarian Union conference in Brussels, SNA was the sole Syrian voice, speaking on behalf of 22 organizations and contributing to the formulation of clear messages calling for flexible funding and investment in local capacities.
- ✓ In Geneva, during the "ICVA" conference, SNA expanded its influence through the Humanitarian Leaders Workshop and high-level diplomatic meetings, particularly those discussing global humanitarian intervention priorities. It also highlighted funding gaps, localization challenges, and the importance of investing in early recovery.



- ✓ Subsequently, SNA coordinated and managed strategic relations with representatives from countries such as Germany, the United Kingdom, France, and the Netherlands, playing a clear role in explaining Syria's complex humanitarian context—especially concerning the realities of displaced populations, operational constraints, and the lack of safe conditions for return. It also presented position papers and strategic analyses to the Dutch Parliament and participated in closed-door meetings on return policies, civilian protection, and issues related to recruitment and unexploded ordnance.
- ✓ SNA strengthened its network of partnerships within Syria and Türkiye by participating in civil society events addressing the aftermath of the July events in Gaziantep and engaging with local advocacy platforms. It also supported media campaigns, launched an advocacy video project, and participated in advanced discussions on rebuilding infrastructure, supporting education, and public health.
- ✓ In the “Starting from Aleppo” workshop, SNA played a pivotal role in conceptualizing post-regime scenarios from a civil society perspective, emphasizing the importance of coordination and leading humanitarian efforts transparently and effectively. Towards the end of the year, the Alliance participated in a workshop on mine clearance, discussed strategies for dealing with unexploded ordnance, and reaffirmed the central role of local communities in leading humanitarian action.

Through these efforts, SNA demonstrated that it is not merely a coordinating body among Syrian organizations but a leading voice representing the aspirations and needs of millions affected inside and outside Syria, while building strategic bridges with international partners to shape a more just and sustainable future for Syrian humanitarian work.

✓ Construction and Installation of Shelter Units

- Construction of Dignified Shelter Units meeting basic humanitarian standards.
- Establishment of integrated residential complexes including housing units, a mosque, and a school.
- Installation of prefabricated housing units (sandwich panels) in targeted areas.
- Erection and insulation of tents to ensure protection from weather conditions.
- Management of a pilot shelter installation site in Gaziantep for assessment and development purposes.

✓ Housing and Infrastructure Rehabilitation:

- Rehabilitation and repair of houses damaged due to war or earthquakes.
- Implementation of rehabilitation projects using integrated mechanisms, including Cash-for-Work schemes.
- Rehabilitation of infrastructure within camps, including water and sewage networks.
- Repair of roads within and around camps to improve accessibility.
- Implementation of rainwater drainage works to prevent flooding and water accumulation.
- Rehabilitation of health centers and schools located within camps.

✓ Winter and In-kind Support

- Distribution of winter kits to affected families.
- Provision of heating equipment and fuel during winter.
- Distribution of winter clothing suitable for targeted age groups.
- Installation of lighting poles in camps equipped with fire extinguishers to enhance public safety.

✓ Cash and Financial Support for Shelter:

- Provision of multipurpose cash assistance to cover shelter and heating needs.
- Implementation of Cash-for-Shelter Rehabilitation programs.

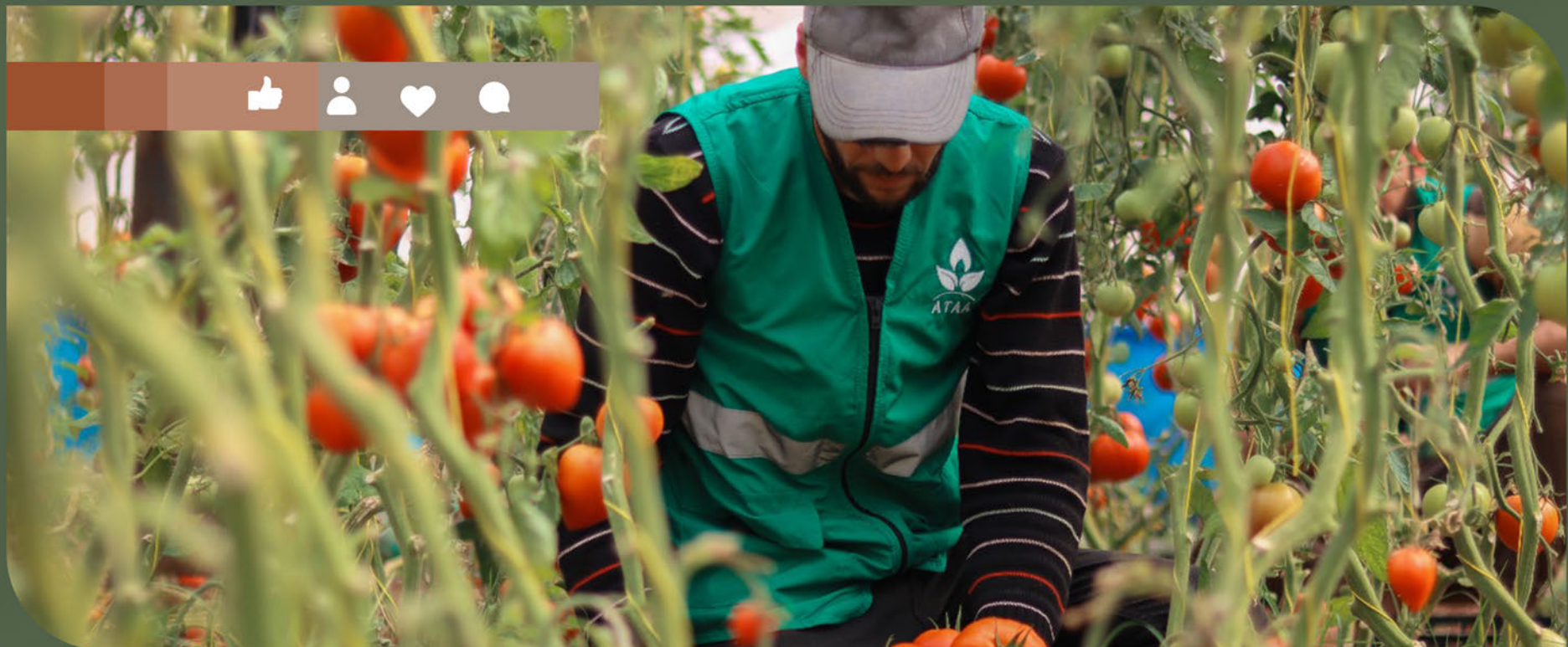

✓ **Water Supply:**

- Provision of water in camps through water networks or distribution tanks.
- Installation and operation of water stations to ensure access to clean water.
- Drilling wells to enhance local water sources.
- Construction and distribution of water tanks at community and household levels for water storage.
- Supplying treatment stations with chlorine to ensure water quality.
- Installation of chlorine pumps to regulate the disinfection process.

✓ **Sanitation and Hygiene:**

- Maintenance and rehabilitation of existing sewage networks.
- Desludging of septic tanks to maintain the efficiency of sanitation systems.
- Construction and rehabilitation of toilets and appropriate sanitation facilities for populations.
- Construction and maintenance of septic tanks.

✓ **In Schools and Health Centers:**

- Provision of WASH services in schools.
- Rehabilitation of health centers in terms of water supply and sanitation systems.

✓ **Infrastructure and Technical Support:**

- Training water unit staff on operation and maintenance.
- Provision of technical support for the operation and maintenance of water stations.

✓ **Cash-for-Work (CfW):**

- Implementation of Cash-for-Work activities across multiple sectors to enhance temporary income opportunities.
- Employment of workers in community service tasks, including debris removal, rehabilitation of roads and markets, and improvement of water and sanitation networks.
- Support to local communities and small-scale farmers through CfW programs that combine livelihoods support with community service.

✓ **Vocational Training and Capacity Building:**

- Organization of technical and vocational training for youth and women in various fields.
- Provision of training on entrepreneurship and small business management.
- Support for apprenticeship programs to enhance practical skills.
- Capacity building for volunteer teams to strengthen community readiness and response.

✓ **Support for Small Businesses and Livelihoods:**

- Support for small and medium enterprises through guidance and funding.

✓ Formal and Non-Formal Education

- Support for formal and non-formal education programs in various target areas.
- Operation of basic education centers, non-formal education centers, and temporary learning centers.
- Implementation of remedial education programs (e.g., remedial reading and math).
- Support for learning circles and special education centers.
- Assessment and monitoring of students' and teachers' performance using tools such as evaluation cards and SDQ surveys.
- Provision of scholarships to support students' continuity in education.

✓ School Infrastructure and Learning Support:

- Construction and rehabilitation of schools to ensure a safe and suitable learning environment.
- Distribution of school furniture (desks, boards, and bookshelves).
- Provision of educational materials, school bags, and stationery.
- Coverage of basic operational costs for schools.
- Provision of supporting services, including fuel, heaters, solar systems, and hygiene materials.
- Provision of transportation for students, including those with disabilities, to facilitate access to education.

Implemented Projects (Primary and Secondary) in the Education Sector

✓ Support for Educational Staff:

- Implementation of teacher training programs (model lessons, supervision sessions, pedagogical skill development).
- Formation and support of teacher committees (PTAs) and learning circles for educational staff.
- Provision of financial incentives to motivate educational staff.
- Provision of logistical support for education offices.

✓ Protection and Psychosocial Support in Schools:

- Implementation of psychosocial support (PSS) sessions within the educational environment.
- Follow-up on individual student cases and provision of case management and referrals as needed.
- Formation of community protection committees in schools to enhance a safe environment.
- Conducting awareness sessions for children and parents on protection issues and the importance of education.
- Implementation of parenting skills sessions to strengthen the family's role in supporting the educational process.

✓ Educational Campaigns and Initiatives:

- Organization of "Back to School" campaigns to increase enrollment rates.
- Support for community initiatives focused on education and special education.
- Implementation of awareness campaigns on children's rights, particularly the right to education.
- Organization of events such as end-of-year celebrations as part of community support and student motivation activities.

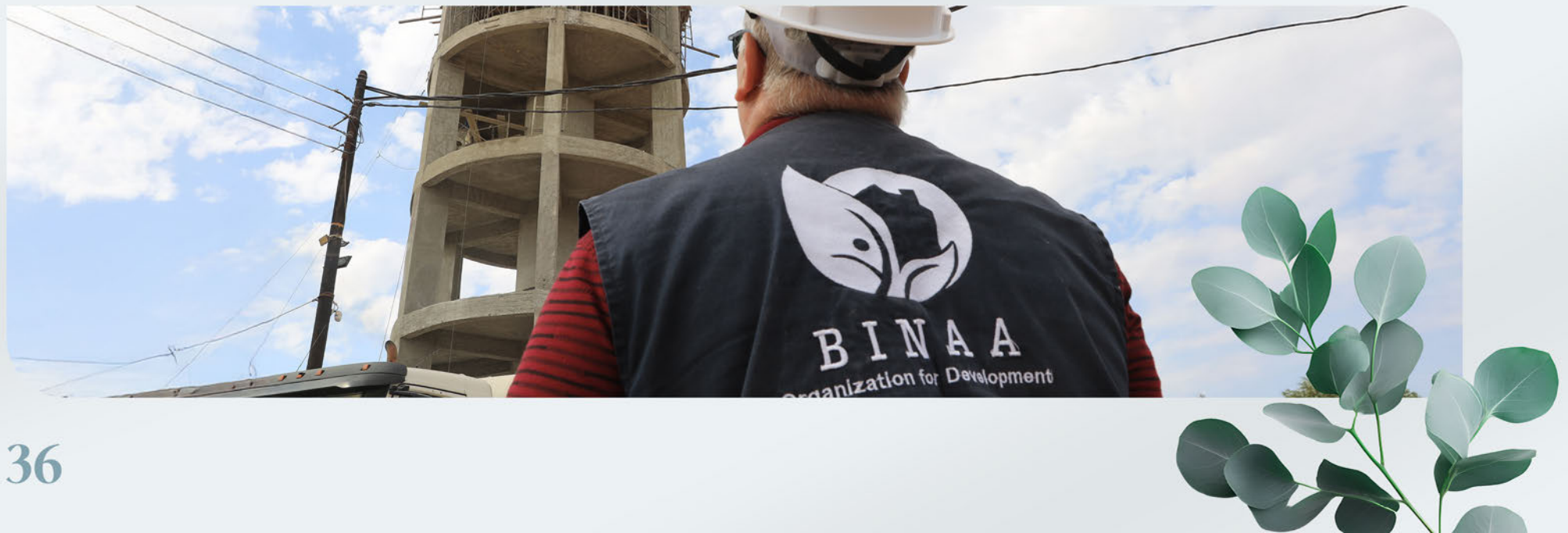
- Provision of leadership and management training in humanitarian contexts to enhance staff efficiency.
- Support for medical education development by building the skills and capacities of health personnel.

✓ Support for Vulnerable Groups:

- Implementation of rehabilitation and training activities for former detainees within social and economic empowerment programs, contributing to their reintegration into society and improving their opportunities for a dignified life.

Key Achievements of SNA in 2024 in the Context of Advocacy and Coordination

- ✓ Throughout 2024, the Syrian NGO Alliance reaffirmed its role as a leading and coordinating actor in humanitarian efforts, achieving a series of tangible results in advocacy and coordination. The year began with an official meeting with a delegation from the Swedish Ministry of Foreign Affairs, organized in cooperation with the Syrian Networks League (SNL), marking a strong start to a year rich in joint action and strategic partnerships.
- ✓ In March, SNA stood out through its active participation in the European Humanitarian Forum in Brussels, where it was the only Syrian representative among more than 1,400 participants from across the globe. Its intervention highlighted the importance of flexible, multi-year funding and investment in local organizations. SNA also took part in the annual ICVA Conference and a dedicated workshop for humanitarian leaders, in addition to several bilateral meetings with foreign missions, strengthening its strategic diplomatic engagement.



- ✓ In April, SNA organized a distinguished side event on the margins of the Brussels Conference, in partnership with several Syrian and international platforms. The discussions focused on pathways for early recovery from a local perspective, with broad participation of around 120 attendees both in person and online. SNA also took part in the “Dialogue Day” sessions within the same conference, contributing to high-level discussions on health, education, refugees, and recovery.
- ✓ May witnessed a strong presence of SNA, which hosted representatives from the German and British governments to discuss funding gaps and ensure the continuity of humanitarian efforts. SNA also took part in the Economic Empowerment Conference in Istanbul and in the ministerial day of the Brussels Conference, while its position was covered by local television. In June, work began on producing a strategic advocacy video to support the continuation of the cross-border aid delivery mechanism.
- ✓ In July, SNA launched a series of specialized trainings on artificial intelligence, fundraising, and donor presentation skills, in partnership with CDG. It was also invited by ECHO to take part in sectoral consultation sessions for planning the year 2025.
- ✓ In the second half of the year, SNA's achievements diversified, including hosting workshops inside Syria, participating in regional conferences, producing position papers, and organizing meetings with European parliaments. It took part in the “Hear Our Voices” conference in Amman, convened a workshop on human resources challenges, and participated in a webinar on the localization experience in Palestine. It also presented a formal position paper, which was discussed in the Dutch Parliament, and hosted a specialized workshop on mine clearance in partnership with MAG. In addition, SNA participated in the “Starting from Aleppo” workshop, which explored the future of multi-sector humanitarian interventions.

All these events and others reflect the SNA's commitment to turning the vision of its members into reality, while strengthening the voice of Syrian organizations on international platforms.

Key Advocacy Products of the SNA for 2024

✓ **1.1. Situation Report – Earthquake Response (SITREP #12)**

Release Date: October 2023

The Syrian NGOs Alliance (SNA) issued the twelfth report in the “Earthquake Response” series, highlighting developments in humanitarian response and the Alliance’s efforts to support affected communities during October.

The SNA issued the thirteenth report in the “Earthquake Response” series, monitoring field updates and analyzing the impact of humanitarian interventions implemented in October.

✓ **1.3. Joint Statement – Continuation of the delivery of humanitarian aid through a reliable mechanism**

Release Date: January 2024

The SNA, in partnership with the Syrian Networks League (SNL), issued a joint statement calling for the continuation of humanitarian assistance to northwest Syria through a reliable and independent mechanism, ahead of the expiration of the deadline granted by the ousted Syrian regime to UN agencies to use the Bab al-Hawa crossing.

✓ **1.4. Video – Escalating Humanitarian Needs Amid Risks of Aid Suspension via Bab al-Hawa**

Release Date: January 2024

SNA produced an awareness video highlighting the increasing humanitarian needs in northwest Syria in light of the risks of suspending aid deliveries through Bab al-Hawa. The video sheds light on the field reality and calls for sustainable solutions to ensure continued support for civilians.

✓ **1.5. Joint Statement – Welcoming the Extension of the Humanitarian Aid Crossing Mechanism and Calling for Unconditional Access to Affected Populations**

Release Date: January 2024

The Northwest Syria NGO Forum, the SNA, and SNL issued a joint statement welcoming the decision to extend the humanitarian aid crossing mechanism to northwest Syria. They emphasized the importance of ensuring unconditional, unrestricted, and timely access to all affected populations.

✓ **1.6. Joint Statement – Commemorating the Anniversary of the February 6 Earthquake**

Release Date: February 2024

SNA, SNL, and the Northwest Syria NGO Forum issued a joint statement on the first anniversary of the devastating earthquake that struck Syria and Türkiye on February 6, 2023. The statement expressed solidarity with affected communities and renewed the organizations' commitment to supporting recovery and response efforts.

✓ **1.7. Video – Press Conference on the Earthquake Anniversary in Azaz**

Release Date: February 2024

SNA organized a press conference in Azaz on the first anniversary of the February 6 earthquake. The conference featured statements from civil society representatives, highlighted humanitarian response efforts, and called for increased international solidarity with affected communities.



✓ **1.8. Joint Advocacy Product – Humanitarian Response in Syria: Syria at a Crossroads**

Release Date: April 2024

SNA, in partnership with NGO forums in northwest and northeast Syria and the Syria International Response Platform (SIRF), issued an advocacy product titled "Humanitarian Response in Syria – At a Crossroads," ahead of the Brussels Conference on Supporting Syria's Future (DoD). The product highlights current challenges and urges international actors to take concrete steps to ensure a more effective and inclusive response for people in need across Syria.



✓ **1.9. Joint Press Statement – Ahead of Brussels Conference 8**

Release Date: May 2024

SNA in partnership with the Syria Platform (SIRF), the Northwest Syria NGO Forum, and the Northeast Syria NGO Forum, issued a joint press statement ahead of the Ministerial Session of the 8th Brussels Conference (B8C). The statement emphasized the need to maintain momentum in humanitarian support for Syria and to ensure that the voices of Syrian civil society are represented in shaping the next phase priorities.

✓ **1.10. Joint Press Statement – After Brussels Conference 8**

Release Date: May 2024

SNA, together with SIRF, the Northwest Syria NGO Forum, and the Northeast Syria NGO Forum, issued a joint press statement following the Ministerial Session of B8C. The statement reviewed the conference outcomes and renewed a call to the international community to take practical and transparent steps to ensure the continuity of humanitarian support and improve its access to all Syrians in need, without discrimination or politicization.

✓ **1.11. Joint Report – Challenges of Work Permits for Humanitarian Organizations**

Release Date: May 2024

SNA in collaboration with the Northwest Syria NGO Forum, issued a joint report highlighting the challenges faced by humanitarian organizations and personnel regarding work permits in northwest Syria. The report reviewed the impact of these challenges on the continuity of humanitarian operations and offered recommendations to improve the work environment and ensure the stability of local and international staff.

✓ 1.12. Video – Continuation of Aid Delivery via Bab al-Hawa to Northwest Syria

Release Date: July 2024

SNA produced an awareness video emphasizing the importance of maintaining humanitarian aid flows through Bab al-Hawa to northwest Syria. The video highlighted the increasing needs on the ground and the necessity of unrestricted aid delivery to ensure effective response for affected civilians.

✓ 1.13. Infographic – International Day of Humanitarian Action

Release Date: August 2024

SNA published an interactive infographic featuring inspirational quotes from executive directors of member organizations, expressing deep appreciation for humanitarian field staff. This work honors humanitarian workers and reaffirms the Alliance's commitment to values of solidarity and recognition on the International Day of Humanitarian Action.



✓ **1.14. Infographic – 11th Anniversary of the Ghouta Chemical Attacks**

Release Date: August 2024

SNA designed a commemorative infographic marking the 11th anniversary of the chemical attacks on Eastern Ghouta in Damascus. The design highlighted the humanitarian tragedy and renewed calls for justice, accountability, and support for victims and survivors.

✓ **1.15. Presentation – Assessing the Fund's Impact After Brussels Conferences**

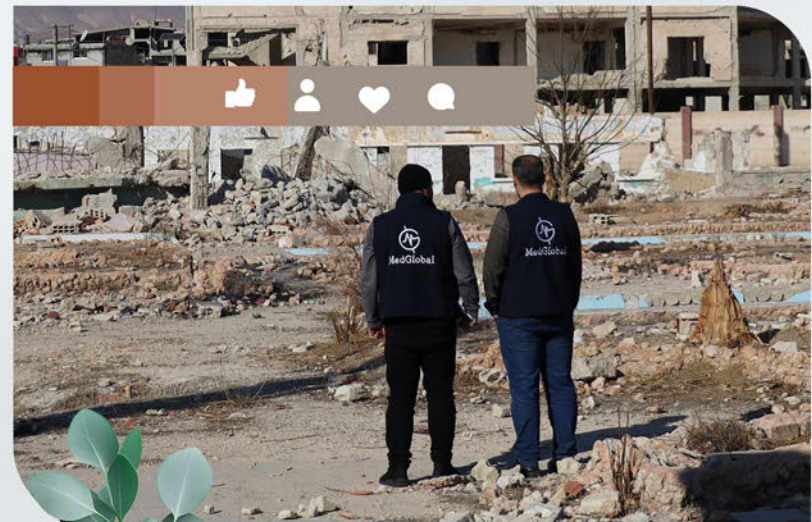
Presentation Date: September 2024

SNA participated in the “Voices from the Field – HoV” conference with a presentation reviewing the humanitarian fund’s contributions in Syria post-Brussels Conferences (BCs). The presentation analyzed the impact of funding on northwest Syria, highlighted challenges and lessons learned and provided recommendations to enhance future support effectiveness.

✓ **1.16. Joint Statement – “Hear Our Voices” Conference (HoV)**

Release Date: September 2024

A joint statement was issued on the occasion of the “Voices from the Field” (HoV) conference by SIRF, in partnership with the SNA and relevant coordination mechanisms responding to the Syrian crisis. The statement emphasized amplifying local actors’ voices, ensuring representation of affected communities in international humanitarian discussions, and called for fairer and more transparent partnerships in humanitarian work.



✓ **1.17. Annual Report 2023 – Activities of the Syrian NGO Alliance (SNA)**

Release Date: September 2024

SNA issued its annual report, highlighting its key activities, achievements, and efforts in coordination and advocacy during 2023–2024. The report showcased effective partnerships, humanitarian responses, challenges faced by the Alliance, and its future vision for enhancing the impact of humanitarian work in Syria.

✓ **1.18. Position Paper – Submitted to the German Federal Office for Migration and Refugees (BAMF)**

Release Date: October 2024

SNA submitted a position paper to the German BAMF, addressing the situation of Syrian refugees and related protection policies. The paper focused on the challenges faced by refugees and provided recommendations to improve asylum conditions and ensure respect for human rights within European migration policies.

✓ **1.19. Initial Response Report – Escalation in November 2024**

Release Date: November 2024

SNA member organizations issued an initial response report documenting humanitarian actions taken in response to the military and humanitarian escalation in northwest Syria in November 2024. The report provided an overview of the field situation and immediate response measures, with preliminary recommendations for addressing the evolving crisis.

✓ **1.20. Second Response Report – Follow-up to November 2024 Escalation**

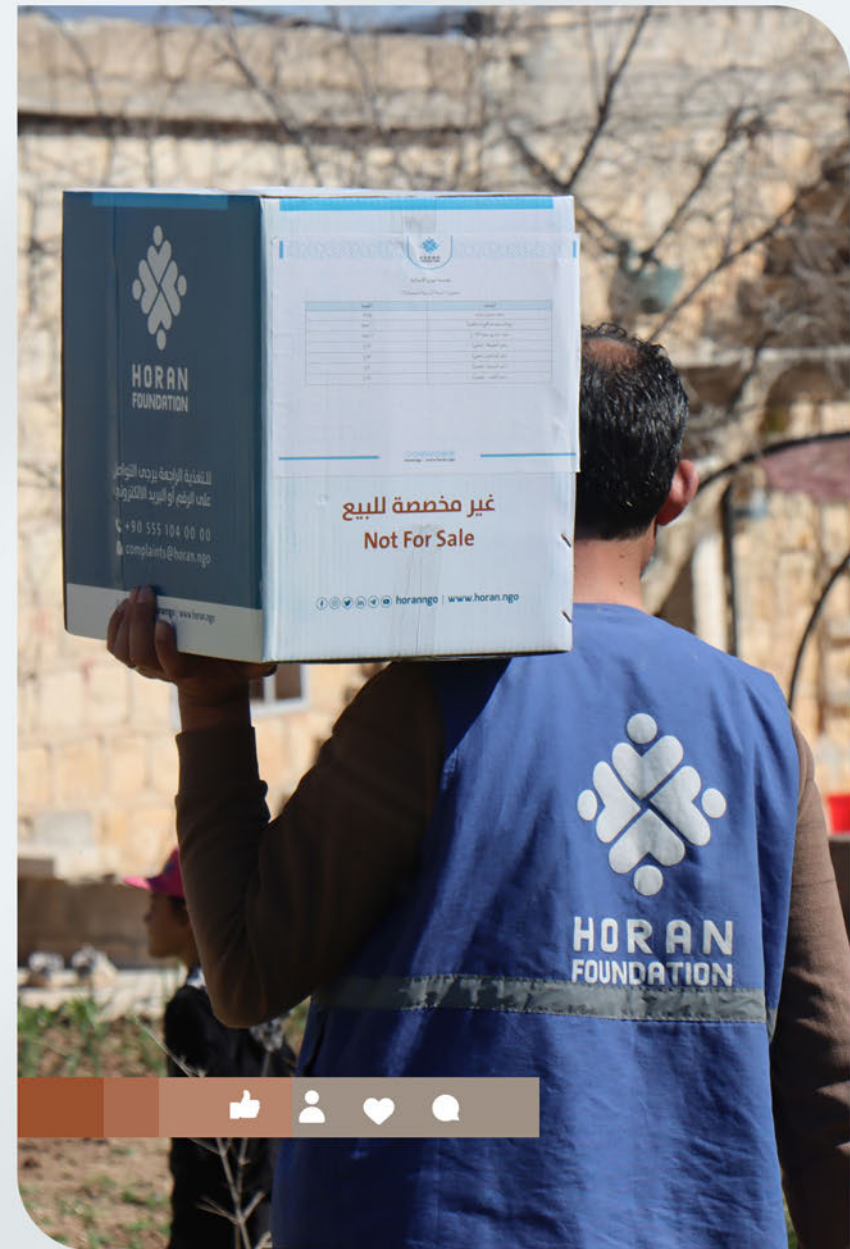
Release Date: December 2024

SNA members issued a second report on ongoing humanitarian response to the November 2024 escalation. The report covered field updates, the expansion of interventions, challenges faced by organizations, and an initial assessment of affected populations' needs, along with recommendations to strengthen immediate coordination.

✓ **1.21. Urgent Call – Call for International Humanitarian Action in Response to Escalation in Northwest Syria**

Release Date: December 2024

SNA issued an urgent appeal calling on the international community and humanitarian actors to act immediately in response to ongoing escalation in northwest Syria. The appeal highlighted the severity of the field situation, threats to civilians, and the urgent need for protection and basic assistance without delay.



✓ **1.22. Urgent Report – Issued by SNA Member Organizations**

Release Date: December 2024

SNA member organizations issued an urgent joint report documenting the main humanitarian impacts of the escalation in northwest Syria, highlighting rapid responses and identifying immediate gaps requiring urgent intervention by actors and donors.

✓ **1.23. Position Paper – Presented to the Dutch Parliament**

Release Date: December 2024

SNA presented a position paper to the Dutch Parliament reviewing developments in the humanitarian situation in Syria. The paper highlighted challenges facing Syrian civil society, the needs of affected populations, and included recommendations for strengthening the Netherlands' role in supporting humanitarian response and protecting civilians' rights.

✓ **1.24. Statement on Recent Developments in Syria**

Release Date: December 2024

SNA issued a bilingual statement (Arabic and English) addressing recent developments in Syria, including humanitarian deterioration and political/security changes. The statement emphasized the need to protect civilians, ensure continued humanitarian assistance free from political interference, and called for fair and balanced international support.



✓ **1.25. Media Contribution – Joint Article with “Syria Direct”**

Publication Date: December 2024

SNA contributed to an analytical article published on “Syria Direct” titled: “Syrian organizations race to respond as international aid actors paralyzed post-Assad.” The article, in Arabic and English, discussed the role of Syrian organizations in leading humanitarian response amid declining international presence, highlighting challenges of funding, localization, and supporting independent local efforts.

✓ **1.26. Participation in Statement – Issued by ICVA Network**

Release Date: December 2024

SNA participated in a joint statement issued by the International Council of Voluntary Agencies (ICVA), focusing on humanitarian challenges in Syria and the importance of supporting and empowering local organizations to play a leadership role. The statement emphasized humanitarian principles and the need for a safe and independent work environment for local actors.

✓ **1.27. Media Interview – Syria TV**

Release Date: January 2025

SNA Coordinator participated in an interview discussing the Alliance’s coordination and advocacy role since 2014 and the humanitarian challenges in Syria, especially after political changes. The interview covered coordination mechanisms within and outside Syria, financial and sanctions-related difficulties, and highlighted the importance of sustainable strategies to ensure effective response, focusing on emergency assistance, recovery, and coordination with authorities to reach those in need.
